They aren't allowed to cycle or skate in the school building. They aren't allowed to smoke in the school yard or building.

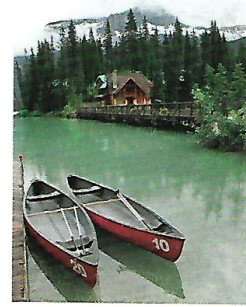
